NESTING DOLLS: Since relocating from San Francisco, choreographer Cid Pearlman has drawn attention with an infectious and audacious style often described as "punk-lyric." Getty Center, Harold M. OIGURI & RENZOKU In 1998, butoh master Oiguri and his troupe Renzoku presented a mesmerizing performance of *In Between the Heartbeat*, a collaborative work that also involved visual artist/performer Hirokazu Kosaka and IKKYU (the bowl archery group). Anyone who missed that memorable event has a second chance as the performers reunite this weekend. The title is taken from a principal of Zen archery, to release the arrow in between the heartbeat for maximum accuracy. The artists raise issues of the paradoxical relationship between humanity and technology amid a set that includes photocopy machines and a patchwork backdrop of 200 electric blankets. ROCHELLE FABRI/MICHAEL SAKAMOTO This double-header offers Fabri's *At First Blush*, exploring issues of female stereotyping in a landscape where Marilyn Monroe meets Marilyn Manson. Sakamoto unveils his newest endeavor, *The Forsaken*, based on the fictional *D-Cri* science-fiction movies filmed in the 1920s and 1960s in Germany and France.

PICK OF THE WEEK

THE C.O.L.A. CONCERTS

A mother's death and the gender-bending protagonist of author Virginia Woolf's *Orlando* are the varied sources of inspiration in the first of two weekends spotlighting four choreographers who received the 2001-2002 C.O.L.A. (City of Los Angeles) fellowships in performing arts. The series opens with Dulce Capadocia and Licia Perea; next weekend focuses on Jacques Heim and Dan Froot. The event marks the welcome re-emergence of Capadocia and Siliyan Philippine American Dance Company. Last year Capadocia considered disbanding the 20-year-old company, but decided to persevere. Her *Mother Night* looks at aging and death, and pays artistic tribute to Capadocia's mother, the company's founder, who died this past February. A schoolteacher for 25 years, Asuncion "Sonia" Capadocia initially employed dance as a vehicle to teach neighborhood kids about Philippine culture. The company has expanded since its concert debut at the Music Center in 1978, with the daughter eventually succeeding the mother at the helm and integrating contemporary American dance elements into the wide spectrum of folkloric traditions of the Philippines' many islands and cultures. In contrast to Siliyan's ensemble piece, Perea's new work, *Orlando of a Thousand Years*, is a solo dance drama that evokes Woolf's fascinating literary creation, who, through 1,000 years of history, was sometimes a man and sometimes a woman. Next weekend's concerts offer Heim's *Diavolo Dance Theater* in the intensely physical *Trajectoire*, and Froot's *Shlamer*, a dance drama surveying several generations of Jewish men during the waning days of vaudeville.
